Biographies

Kerry Scott

Kerry Stott is a mental health nurse who is currently researching toxic shame and emotional flashbacks for her Master's degree. Clinically, she has an active interest in trauma, complex trauma, and neurodiversity with a passion for collaborative working and patient centred care. This dedication to her work has resulted in her winning multiple awards for her nursing. Kerry is neurodiverse and has ADHD, dyslexia, and dyscalculia, she cites her neurodiversity as the driving power behind her being able to see and resolve problems differently from other clinicians. She is currently undertaking a BASHH Fellowship mapping the roles of non-medical clinical staff in GUM/SRH clinics across the UK. Her experience includes positions on the BASHH Sexual Violence and Domestic Abuse Special Interest Group, and as a Research Assistant within the E-Health Unit at the Centre for Primary Care and Public Health at UCL. She holds an MRes in Clinical Research from City University of London and previously led the Sexual Health Information and Protection Team of ANPs at Imperial College NHS Trust.

Sophie Strachan

For over two decades, Sophie Strachan has dedicated her career to advancing sexual and reproductive health, with a particular focus on gender equity and the HIV response. As the CEO of the Sophia Forum, a UK-based peer-led HIV charity, Sophie leads initiatives aimed at improving the lives of women through policy advocacy, participatory research, and community-focused interventions.

In addition to her leadership role, Sophie serves as the Community Research Co-Investigator for the UK LA PrEP Preference Study (PrEP-position) in collaboration with the SHARE Collaborative. This groundbreaking work explores preferences around long-acting PrEP, contributing to the development of more inclusive and effective prevention strategies.

Sophie's commitment to sexual health extends to her role as a Sexual Health Advisor in London, where she continues to provide compassionate care and champion health equity. Her dedication to marginalized communities is exemplified by her longstanding work in prisons, which spans more than 20 years. Through peer support, research, and education, she has made a lasting impact on the lives of incarcerated individuals and the staff who support them.

With an unwavering focus on advocacy, research, and education, Sophie Strachan remains a pivotal voice in the global effort to address HIV, promote sexual health, and achieve gender equity.

Pank Sethi

Since his release from prison, Pank has become a powerful advocate for social change, earning recognition as a leading expert in education and advocacy for HIV and sexual health services within UK prisons. His lived experience fuels his passion and commitment, making him a transformative figure in the field.

Fully immersed in the sexual health sector, Pank oversees HIV and STI testing services for the London Health Prevention Program at Positive East and the GMI Partnership. As an HIV Ambassador for London Fast Track Cities and a Positive Voices Speaker, he actively promotes awareness and education, while contributing to the steering group for the HIV Confident Charter Mark, driving initiatives to reduce stigma and improve care standards.

Pank also serves as a trustee for the Shannon Trust and Revolving Doors, becoming the first trustee with lived experience of the criminal justice system. His unique perspective ensures that the voices of those both organizations aim to support remain central to their decisions and strategies.

Through his dedication to advocacy, education, and leadership, Pank continues to influence policy and practice, making a profound impact on the lives of marginalized communities and advancing the fight for equity and justice.
